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### PREFACE.

The greater part of the information as to the early posterity of Isaac Willey, in the following pages, was derived from copies of "The Records of the town of East Haddam, the records of the several churches there; the inscriptions in the several cemeteries; from various private and family records; and the records of the neighboring towns and churches," taken between 1856 and 1866 by D. Williams Patterson, Esq., of Newark Valley, N. Y.; and revised by him for me in 1884; supplemented by further investigations made by him in Connecticut at my instance, in the winter of 1885. For his kindness and liberality in this matter, and for the generous aid and advice he has so freely given me at all times, I desire here to express my heartiest thanks. To the knowledge thus obtained I have added that procured by myself from family records, from printed books, and from correspondence with many persons, to all of whom, too numerous to mention individually here, I beg to return my thanks for their kindness in answering my inquiries, and in aiding in the completeness of my work.

The statistics on p. v of the Preliminary Remarks are slightly changed by additions made during the printing of the work.

On page 1, line 6, for Edward read Andrew.

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### PRELIMINARY.

Of persons named WILLEY there were in New England at the earliest period, according to Savage and other authorities:

- 1. ISAAC WILLEY, of Charlestown, Boston and New London, the subject of the following genealogy, and his children.
- 2. ALLEN, who had wife Alice. They were admitted to the 1st ch. in Boston, Nov. 2, 1634. The frequent recurrence of the name Allen in the Willey family suggests the query whether he may not have been the father of Isaac Willey.
- 3. RICHARD, who m. Eliza, dau. of Edward and Ruth Willis, and had dau. RUTH, b. Oct. 13, 1687. Boston Rec. p. 177.
- 4. ALICE, who m. Dec. 5, 1659, John Garretson. Ib. p. 72, "Perhaps dau. of Isabel," says Savage, but of the latter there is no other mention.
- 5. ABIGAIL, dau. of HANNAH Willey, bap. in Charlestown in 1687. G. R. xxvii, p. 276.
  - 6. Frances, who m. May 16, 1652, Joseph Howe. Boston Rec. p. 38.
- 7. Thomas, Edward, and Richard Willey were in the Boston tax lists for 1687-89. Edward came to Boston in 1682, and was a juror there in 1686. G. R. i, p. 139. He was brother-in-law to Rev. John Bailey, (Proc. Mass. Hist. Soc., x, p. 342,) and is mentioned in Drake's Hist. of Boston, p. 482, under date of 1686, as having "fled on account of persecution." See Dunton's Letters from N. E., p. 81.
- 8. WILLIAM WILLEE, servant of Thomas King, was one of the early settlers of "Old Norfolk," Mass. G. R. viii, p. 169.
- 9. Thomas Willey, of Dover, N. H., and his children, where he was taxed in 1648. Their descendants settled in N. H. and Maine, and there is a tradition that their ancestor came from Newcastle-upon-Tyne. Mention is made of them in numerous volumes of G. R., in N. H. Colonial Rec. i, p. 308, ii, pp. 36, 37, v. pp. 38, 41, 48: N. H. Town Papers, xi, pp. 507, 570, vii, p. 50; Hamilton, Hist. of Rockingham and Stafford Cos., N. H., pp. 616, 780, 798, 799. Samuel was a favorite name in that family. The Willeys of Conway, N. H., probably belonged to this family, among whom were Samuel Willey, Jr., who perished in the slide in the Notch, Aug. 28, 1826, (G. R. xxx, p. 468,) and his brother, Rev. Benjamin Glazier Willey, who wrote "Incidents in White Mountain History," of whom see notice in Cong. Quarterly, 1867, p. 300.
- 10. The John Wiley, or Willey, mentioned by Savage, iv, p. 463, and G. R. ii, p. 48, as an early settler of Reading, Mass., was probably not a Willey. Was he the John Willey of Reading, who settled in Colchester, Conn.? See Larned, Hist. of Windham Co., Conn., i, p. 307, seq.
- 11. JOHN WILLEY m. in Watertown, Mass., Jan. 21, 1644, Elizabeth Clough. (Bond, Watertown Genealogies, p. 162.) The same, p. 967, says that

March 13, 1710-11, and again in 1715, objection was made to the settlement of Elizabeth Willey, from Boston, perhaps a descendant of his.

- 12. DAVID WILLEY, a soldier of the Revolution, mentioned in Hollister's Hist. of Pawlet, Vt., p. 21, is said in Vt. Hist. Gaz. iii, p. 872, to have been a soldier in the French and Indian war, and one of the early settlers of Pawlet.
- 13. Capt. John Wiley, or Willey, was capt. in the 8th Mass. Bay Reg't in 1775. Hamersly, Army Register. He is referred to in records in the office of the Sec. of the State, in Boston, vol. 146, pp. 138, 238, 241, 243, having been recommended by some and objected to by others, as an officer in the Revolution. Capt. John Wiley, of Col. Tinkham's Mass. Reg't, had a claim of \$332.68, which was formally reported on in 1792. U. S. State Papers, (claims) 1834, p. 392. Capt. John Wylie m. in 1787, Elizabeth, dau. of Jacob and Elizabeth (Hall) Tappan. G. R. xxxiv, p. 53.
- 14. Jonathan Willee, of Lynn, Mass., m. Tamzen, dau. of Phineas and Tamzen (Hall) Upham, of Malden, Mass. Marriage intentions pub. June 17, 1750. G. R. vii, p. 241; xxiii, p. 30.
- 15. SALLY, w. of John Willey, and 2 ch., were buried in Malden, Mass., in 1803. G. R. ix, p. 243.
- 16. SARAH WILLEY m. in Stoneham, Mass., June 1, 1773, Caleb, s. of Caleb and Sarah (Richardson) Richardson. Richardson Gen. p. 258.
- 17. Sukey, dau. of James Willey, of Stoneham, Mass., m. April 6, 1813, Stephen, s. of Jerusha (Richardson) Locke. Ib. p. 254.
- 18. EPHRAIM WILLEY, of Boston, Mass., m. Mary, dau. of Jonathan and Mary (Bryant) Noble, of Boston, who was b. Feb. 14, 1794. Noble Gen. p. 741.
- 19. SAUL WILLEY, of Hartford, Conn., is mentioned in a foot note in Godwin's Notes, p. 49, under date of 1679.
- 20. ROBERT WILLEY, an emigrant from Ireland, settled in Antrim, N. H., as early as 1784, and m. probably as 2d w., Nabby Campbell, of New Boston, N. H., Jan. 15, 1785. "It is believed his descendants are living in Rochester, Vt." Hist. of Antrim, p. 770.

There are no records to show what relationship, if any, existed between the early Willeys of Boston and its vicinity, or to trace their descendants. The Campton Willeys knew those of Conway, and thought there was a relationship, but no proof of it has been found.

23. As to the origin and etymology of the name, there have been various conjectures. According to Lower, English Surnames, Willey means "favorable ones," which seems a mere guess based on a local meaning. In Edmunds, Traces of the History of the Names of Places, we read: "Willey, Willy, Wilye, from the Wil, Wyl, or Wilts tribe, whose setu or tribe station gave name to the district of Wilraduocyie, now Wiltshire: ex., the river Wilen, now Willey, Wilton, &c." According to Hoare, Hist. of Ancient Wiltshire, the name is said to be derived from the Celtic word Gwy, meaning water. In Pearson's Historical maps of England, Willey is given as Anglo-Saxon for Wiley. In that language Wyl means a spring. But Arthur, Hist. of Family Names, N. Y. 1857, p. 267, says Wilts is from Welsh gwylt, meaning a wild forest, a desert. Mr. Edward Whitaker, in an article on the name Willey in Good Words, quoted in the Library Magazine, n. s. vol. v. p. 268, derives the name, in common with other names commencing with Wil, from that of William the Conqueror, whose name, he says, originated more surnames than any other baptismal appelation, and that names derived from it stand third in point of commonness among the English cognomina, being excelled only by Smith and Jones. But the correctness of this derivation, as applied to all the names cited by him, is open to dispute. In the anonymous work, The Norman People and their Descendants, London, 1874, which is an attempt to prove that there is a larger Norman element among the English people than is generally supposed, the author on p. 78 says, "Labials and other letters are frequently interchanged," and gives as one of the examples "Willy-Velly"; and on p. 448, "Willey-Petrus and Philip de Velly and the fief of Normandy, t. Philip Augustus [1165.] Adam, John Willey, Eng. c. 1272." The authorities cited by him, Mem. of the Antiquarian Soc. of Normandy, v, and Rotuli Hundredorum, English Records Publication, have not been within my reach. There are in France the modern names Villey, Villy, and Willy, the last being the surname of one of the Rothschilds; and in German the name Wille; and a gentleman named Willey, in Cincinnati, says his family is of German origin. In "Old Sports and Sportsmen; or, the Willey Country," London 1873, p. 70, we read: "The name is said to be of Saxon origin; and in wattle and dab and wicker-work times, when an osier-bed was probably equal in value to a vineyard, the place might have been, as the word seems to suggest, one where willows grew, seeing that various osiers, esteemed by basket-makers, coopers and turners, still flourish along the stream winding past it to the Severn." This corresponds with the conjecture of Allen Willey (No. 212.) Willow is in Saxon welig. Skeat, Etymological Dict., says, "in provincial English, Willy means not only a willow, but a wicker basket," the Aryan root being wi, meaning to bind, to weave. Halliwell's Dict. of Archaic and provincial words gives the following: "Willey, 1, a Withy, North; 2, a child's nightgown, Cumb." "Willy, 1, favorable, A. S.; 2, a large wicker basket, South.; 3, a bull, Isle of Wight." Barnes, (the Dorsetshire poet,) in "Early England and the Saxon English," says: "Wiltshire is so-called from Wilton, its old chief town on the River Wiley. Wiley, in British Gwillwy, or in the soft form Willwy, means the straggling (stream), whence Wily, and then Wiltun, or Wilton, and lastly Wiltonscire, or Wiltshire." Among so many etymologies and conjectures, it is difficult to decide what was the origin of the

personal name Willey, and it would require more means of historical research than are within my reach to determine. The name, in its origin, probably goes farther back than any of the researches of the etymologists have extended.

The "Willey country" is in Shropshire, Eng., along the banks of the Severn, and includes the present parish of Willey. After the conquest, according to the authority above cited, "it fell to the lot of a Norman named Turold. Domesday book says: "The same Turold holds Willey, and Hunwit, [the Saxon occupier, of him." At the death of the latter the manor passed to a family which took its name from the place, and considerable additions resulted from the marriage of one, Warner de Williley, with the heiress of Roger Fitz Odo, of Kenley." It is now the property of Lord Forester, and the estate is called Willey Park. In the British Gazeteer, Willey is the name of a hundred in Bedfordshire, embracing 18 parishes, and of parishes or hamlets in Devon, Hereford, Shropshire and Warwickshire, in which last there is an ancient church called Willey church. (N. & Q., Dec. 10, 1885.) The name of the parish in Wiltshire is in the Gazeteer given as Wylye or Wiley. "Willey-hove" is the name of a remarkable barrow, about 10 miles from Bidlington, Yorkshire. (Hand-book of Yorkshire.) The word in the terms "Willey-house," &c., used in the manufacture of wool in Yorkshire, is said to be a corruption of vinnow. (N. & Q., Nov. 20, 1886.) The personal name occurs in Durham, Northumberland, Yorkshire, Herts, (as early as 1398), in Plymouth (1568), in Somersetshire, and in an early Bristol Will. It has been a common one in England to the present time.

24. The fullest account of any English Willeys is given in Surtees, Hist. of Durham, vol. ii, p. 74, the family of John Willey of Heburne, Northumberland. He had a s. John, whose date is 1366, and whose son John was a citizen of London, 12 Hen. iv, (1411,) whose s. John in 1445 took his maternal name Heyworth, and released all his right in his father's lands to his cousins Richard and John Willey. Richard, the other s. of the 2d John, had a s. John, who had a son in 1476. Another family, given in vol iv, p. 5, was Willey of Haughton-le-side, Durham. His arms were, "Per pale Erminois and Gules, three chevrons countercharged. Crest, out of a crown Gules, a reindeer's head, Erminois, attired argent, mantled Gules, doubled Argent." This crest was confirmed by Sir Richard St. George, Norroy, May 18, 1615. The ancestor, —Willie of Houghton-le-side, had s. Ralph, who had s. John, who had s. Ralph of Croft, gent., 1650, who paid a composition of £1, 13, 4, for his estate, as a loyalist. The Visitations of these counties in the Harleian MSS., British Museum, Nos. 1153, 1448, 1540, 1554, give the same genealogies.

There was a tradition in two branches of the descendants of Isaac Willey, that their ancestor came from Wiltshire, (see No. 212,) and a similar tradition was obtained in Conn. by Ogden M. Willey in 1837. The name Wilts appears to have been corrupted into Wales, and hence some of the family have supposed that they were of Welsh extraction. The fact that these traditions ascribed the origin of the name to the River Willey in Wilts, gives some color to this tradition; but the name has not been found by me in that county. There was a singular tradition that the family was descended from a Welsh prince, or, according to another version, that one of its ancestors married a daughter of Charles II, (see No. 925.) For the origin of this tradition it is now impossible to account, and it remains for future research to ascertain who were the

ancestors of Isaac Willey of New London. All that can be said at present is that he emigrated to this country before 1640, but whether he married here or in the old country is unknown.

25. Ten generations are included in the following pages; and there is one descendant in the female line in the 11th generation. Of persons bearing the name Willey, there are 568 males and 560 females, (besides two or three whose sex is not given); in all, 1128. In the 1st generation, 1 male; in the 2d, 3 males, 4 females; in the 3d, 6 males, 4 females; in the 4th, 18 males, 18 females; in the 5th, 36 males, 39 females; in the 6th, 87 males, 85 females; in the 7th, 114 males, 104 females; in the 8th, 159 males, 158 females; in the 9th, 110 males, 91 females; in the 10th, 22 males, 34 females. In regard to age, there were in the 2d generation 1 over 70; in the 3d, 2 over 80; in the 4th, 3 over 70 and 2 over 80; in the 5th, 18 over 70, 13 over 80, and 4 over 90; in the 6th, 30 over 70, 23 over 80, and 6 over 90; in the 7th, 44 over 70, 15 over 80, 4 over 90, and one (No. 766) who lived to 104. There are living in the 7th generation 18 who are over 70 and 7 who are over 80. In the 8th generation there are 6 over 70, of whom 4 are living. Families of from 7 to 12 children were not infrequent. The largest family had 17 children. The number of descendants not bearing the name Willey is 1059. A perusal of the record will show that the family has been well and creditably represented in the learned professions, especially the ministry, and that no crime attaches to any member of it. It has borne its share in military service, from before the Revolution to the civil war. The statistics of ages are of course imperfect, owing to deficiencies in dates, but the stock appears to be one that is quite tenacious of life.

The name Willey appears in some of the English lists of persons having claims to money or other property. But there is not the slightest reason to suppose that any person in this country, of the stock of Isaac Willey, could establish any right to property in England.

In the following Genealogy, the numbers at the left are the consecutive numbers of the individuals. Those in the centre refer back to the ancestor; and those to the right, forward to the descendants of the individual opposite whom they are placed. The descendants of males follow one another in the order of their ancestors; but those of a female are all placed with her under the generation to which she belongs.

I have noticed, as a trifling coincidence, that the 19th day of the month occurs oftener than any other, and the 19th of July more frequently than any other single date.

was of Boston, Mass., as early as 1640, and removed to Charlestown, Mass., before 1644. All that is known about him there are the records of his children given by Savage and in the Boston Record of births, &c. He had wife Joanna, who died in New London, Conn., where he m. after 1670 Anna, widow of Edward Lester, (see No. 2.) She died in 1692. In 1645 he went with John Winthrop, Jr., to New London. What is known about him there is given in Miss Caulkins's History of N. L. Her notice is as follows, (p. 310):

#### "Isaac Willey, died about 1685.

"Willey's houselot was on Mill brook, at the base of Post Hill. He was an agriculturist, and soon removed to a farm at the head of Nahantic River, which was confirmed to 'old Goodman Willie' in 1664. It is probable that both he and his wife Joanna had passed the bounds of middle age, and that all their children were born before they came to the banks of the Pequot. Isaac Willey, Jr., was a married man at the time of his death in 1662. John Willey was one who wrought on the mill-dam in 1657; Abraham had married and settled in Haddam before his father's decease. No other sons are known. Hannah, wife of Peter Blatchford, is the only daughter expressly named as such, but inferential testimony leads us to enroll among the members of this family Joanna, wife of Robert Hempstead, and afterward of Andrew Lester; Mary, wife of Samuel Tubbs; and Sarah, wife of John Terrall.

"Isaac Willey married second, after 1670, Anna, relict of Andrew Lester, who survived him. The Willey farm was sold to Abel Moore and Chr. Christophers. John Willey married in 1670 Miriam, daughter of Miles Moore. He lived beyond the head of Nahantic, and when the bounds between New London and Lyme were determined, his farm was split by the line, leaving twenty acres, on which stood his house, in New London.

"Abraham Willey, the ancestor of the Haddam family, married Elizabeth, daughter of Thomas Mortimer, of New London."

In a note, Miss Caulkins says he wrote his name Isark Willey. She was, however, misinformed as to Abraham being the ancestor of the Haddam family.

From the authorities cited by Miss Caulkins we learn that in 1645 Isaac Willey and John Stebbins mowed the meadows of the Upper Mamacook. At a meeting held Feb. 25, 1647, he was chosen, with John Winthrop, Robert Hempsteed, Samuel Lothroup and Thomas Minor, "to act in all Tounc affaires;" and at the

same meeting he was granted "to have a planting lot at the other side of the cove, near Mr. deane winthrops lot." The house lots originally numbered 38, but the number was reduced to 36. The first grantee was John Winthrop, Esq., and Isaac Willey was the fifth after him, "his homestead lying north west of Mr. Winthrop's on the upper part of what are now Williams street and Main street." His name occurs as one of sixteen who had cattle marks before 1650. At a General Court in May, 1649, "certain individuals at Pequot," viz., Robert Bedell, Cary Latham and Isaac Willey, charged with resisting a constable and letting go an Indian committed to their charge, were summoned to appear at Hartford and answer for their conduct. Referring to rate bills of Sept. 20, 1657, Miss Caulkins says: "After enumerating house and houselot, meadow, marsh and upland, the planter had from two to four cows; half a dozen calves, yearlings and two years old; a litter of swine and two or three sheep, or perhaps a share in two or three sheep. This was all the ratable property of even some of the oldest settlers, as Willey." About 1652, two necks of land, one of them called "a pyne neck," with a broad cove between them, east of Pequot River, were granted to him, and sold by him to Amos Richardson. The Nahantic farm is described as "rounding the head of the river." His name is 15th in the list of 21 freemen in 1669. [Conn. Colon. Rec., ii, p. 523.] Nov. 29, 1669, the town appointed Wm. Hough, John Stebbins, Clement Minor and Isaac Willey "to lay out the King's highway between New London and the head of Niantick river." He appears to have been a participant in the affray in Aug. 1671, arising out of the disputed lands between New London and Lyme, now East Lyme, as he was among those arraigned at Hartford, March 12, 1671-2, (Miss Caulkins has it inadvertently 1661-2,) "for attempts by violence to drive Mr. Mathew Griswold and Lieut. Wm. Waller off their lands, and resistance to authority and assault." [Conn. Colonial Rec., ii, p. 558.] He took probate of the will of his son-in-law, Thomas Hungerford, at Hartford, July 9, 1663. [Goodwin, p. 201.]

In 1667, Goodwife Willey was presented before the court "for not attending public worship and bringing her children thither," and fined 5 shillings. [Miss Caulkins, p. 250.]

## SECOND GENERATION.

### Children of ISAAC<sup>1</sup> [1] and Joanna Willey.

- 2 I. JOANNA,<sup>2</sup> birth not recorded. Miss Caulkins says that she was 2d w. of Robert Hempstead, who d. at N. L. in June, 1655, after which she became the 2d w. of Andrew Lester. But Savage doubts the existence of such a dau. in the household of Willey, or of such a w. in that either of Hempstead or Lester.
- 3 II. ISAAC,<sup>2</sup> bap. on his mother's right at Boston, Aug. 2, 1640, [Boston Rec., p. 10]; m. there June 8, 1660, Frances, dau. of Edward Burcham, of Lynn, [ib., p. 76.] They removed to N. L., where he d. in Aug. 1662, and his wid. m. (2d), in the same year, Clement Minor. She d. Jan. 6, 1672–3, and he d. in Oct. 1700. For his ancestry see Miss Caulkins, and Orcutt, Hist. of Wolcott, Conn., p. 521.

Miss Caulkins, at p. 280, (not noted in the index,) says: "He was a young man, probably not long married. His inventory, though slender, contains a few articles not very common, viz., 'tynen pans, a tynen quart pot, cotton yarn,' &c., together with one so common as to be almost universal,—a dram cup, which appears in nearly every inventory for a century or more after the settlement. He left no children."

4 III. HANNAH,<sup>2</sup> bap. in Boston, March 6, 1641–2, [Boston Rec. p. 37]; m. at N. L. as his 2d w., ab. 1658, Thomas Hungerford, of N. L. as early as 1657, who d. in 1663. Of his 3 ch., Thomas, Sarah and Hannah, (b. May 1, 1659, and who m. a Mr. Ross of Long Island,) the last was the dau. of this wife. She m. (2d), Peter Blatchford of N. L., and went with him to Haddam, where he d. Sept. 1, 1671. They had 3 ch., Peter, Hannah and Joanna. She m. (3d), in 1673, Samuel Spencer of Millington, where she d. ab. 1681, after which Spencer m. the wid. of her brother John Willey. [See Goodwin, p. 201., Mem. Hist. of Hartford Co., i, pp. 231, 247.]

- 5 IV. SARAH,<sup>2</sup> b. at Charlestown, Mass., June 19, 1644; m. perhaps as his 2d w., John Terrall (Tyrrel) of N. L. in 1662, who d. Feb. 27, 1711–12; and she d. March 7, succeeding. They had 2 ch., William and Mary, bap. May 7, 1671.
- 6 V. MARY,<sup>2</sup> b. ab. 1648; m. Samuel Tubbs, who applied for permission to remain in N. L. in 1663.

He and John Willey, (No. 7,) both deceased before 1701, were of the Connvolunteers in King Philip's war to whom were granted lands in Voluntown, Conn., in 1696, for their services. [Narragansett Hist. Reg., 1882, p. 146.] He d. in 1696, and she was living in 1725, being then aged 77. They had 6 ch., (and perhaps others,) whose names are given by Savage, viz.: Mary, Bethia, both bap. in May, 1671; Samuel, bap. in July, 1672; William, bap. in May, 1674; Dorcas, bap. March 2, 1689; and Joseph, bap. Sept. 3, 1696.

7 VI. JOHN,<sup>2</sup> b. at N. L. ab. 1648; m. there, March 18, [9 1668-69, Miriam, dau. of Miles and Isabel (Joyner) Moore.

He was one of those who wrought at the mill-dam in 1651. He lived beyond the Head of Nahantick, (see No. 1.) The land in Lyme was confirmed to him by the town Sept. 23, 1682, being described as follows: "At the head of Nehantuck River, twenty acres of upland be it more or less: bounded easterly with New London bounds, and every way else with the Commons, at the South East Corner at a white oak tree, at the North East Corner at a white oak tree being a little without the fence now standing, at the North West Corner by a Reed oake tree, at the South West Corner with a stake." The same land, with some in N. L., was sold Feb. 17, 1692-93, by John and Isaac Willey, to Capt. Edward Palmer. They both subscribed by a mark, and were described as sons of John Willey, late of Haddam, deceased. Three purchases of land, made by Isaac and John Willey in 1692 and 1709 and later, from Amos and Samuel Tinker, in the N. W. part of Lyme, with a considerable tract adjoining in East Haddam, remained the home of the Willey family for nearly a century, until it had been divided among successive generations into very small parcels. John Willey d. at Haddam, May 2, 1688. The inventory of his estate, amounting to £169 13 06, was presented at Hartford, Nov. 6, 1689, by his widow, who was appointed to administer the estate, with Alexander Rollo and Thomas Hungerford to assist her and to oversee her and her children. She m. (2d) in 1689, Samuel Spencer.

8 VII. ABRAHAM,<sup>2</sup> b. at N. L. perhaps ab. 1650; m. [16 Elizabeth, dau. of Thomas and Elizabeth Mortimer, of N. L. Miss Caulkins erroneously calls him the ancestor of the Haddam Willeys. Savage says he d. at Haddam in 1692, leaving widow Elizabeth and 3 children.

R. xxxv, p. 382,] (2d) Sarah, dau. of William Ashfell, late of North Yarmouth, Me. He seems to have been living in 1751.

- 11 III. JOHN,<sup>3</sup> b. at N. L. Feb. 24, 1674–75; bap. Mar. [ **30** 24; m. at E. H. in Oct. 1698, Elizabeth, dau. of John Harvey of N. L., who was b. ab. 1680.

They joined the ch. in Hadlyme May 18, 1752, when she was bap. and was called 72 years old. He d. at HL. June 19, 1754, according to his gravestone, while the ch. record says June 20, in his 83d year, which seems to be an exaggeration of his age. Sales of land to his son Allen in 1727, and to his son John in 1752, of his house lot, with house and 12 acres, are recorded. Grants of land were made to him in 1727 and 1750, when he was described as "Serg't John Willey." Administration of his estate was granted, Aug. 6, 1754, to Joseph Willey. It amounted to £139 0 11, and it appeared that his sons had received their shares in his lifetime, and the right in the undivided land was distributed among the eight daughters.

She is mentioned in his will, dated Ap. 17, 1746, proved Oct. 2, 1752, of which his son Abel is named executor,

and who accepted the trust Nov. 7, 1752. The inventory amounted to several hundred pounds.

Sept. 23, 1739, he deeded to his son Samuel Willey land, with house, &c., in the north part of Lyme, which he had of Nathaniel Darrow. This land was sold by Samuel Willey, Feb. 20, 1743, to Zachariah Willey, for £73, and the latter sold to Samuel Willey, (date not given,) "for £30 in bills of credit, or £7 10 in lawful money, two and a half acres of land, being the northwest corner of that land which my honored father Isaac Willey gave me." - 16 I. THOMAS,<sup>3</sup> b. at N. L. ab. 1684 or '85; was called [51 7½ years old at the settlement of his father's estate in 1692; professed the Covenant and was bap. at N. L., June 2, 1706; m. at N. L. Dec. 16, 1708, Ann Hough. [Thomas Willey of Colchester, and his sons Thomas and Jabez, were bap. June 27, 1734. Hinman MSS. in Library of N. E. Gen. Soc. in Boston.]
- 17 II. ABRAHAM,<sup>3</sup> b. at N. L. ab. 1686 or '87; was called 5½ years old at the settlement of his father's estate; d. before Feb. 12, 1711–12, when administration of his estate was granted at N. L. to his brother Thomas.

He was admitted a freeman at Lyme, Sept. 11, 1753. He had 4½ acres of land laid out in the 9th division of E. H., Feb. 9, 1749–50. He probably lived and d. in Lyme, as the settlement of the estate does not appear in E. H. probate records. If in Lyme, the record was probably destroyed by the fire of the British in 1781. Darius Willey, of Lyme, as executor of his will, sold land in Lyme, Ap. 21, 1769, to Jonathan Warner, and by authority of an Act of the Assembly passed in June, 1769, to Abel Willey of E. H., Ap. 21, 1769. Widow Deliverance Willey exchanged Land in Lyme, Aug. 17, 1771, with her dau. Deliverance Allen, and sold land there to her dau. Abigail Willey, Ap. 9, 1783; and to her "loueing and dutyfull Daughter" Miriam Atwood of Lyme, wife of Daniel Atwood of L.; and March 23, 1773, to Jonathan Warner, land at Warner's Wharf, (probably now Comstock's Ferry.) bounded E. and S. by land of widow Deliverance Allen.

He d. in 1757, aged 46, when, Oct. 29, administration of his estate was granted to Samuel Willey. The inventory amounted to £30 5 10, with a subsequent addition, and the estate was represented insolvent. Among his creditors were Allen, John, Joseph, and David Willey. All household goods and one third of the real property were set off to his widow Patience Willey, who was appointed guardian to their younger children.

- 29 XI. ZACHARIAH,<sup>4</sup> b. at L., Nov. 24, 1716; bap. at [74 E. H., May 26, 1717; had wife Rachel, who was bap. at HL., Dec. 8, 1745, at the same time as their two children.

He d. before Dec. 3, 1751, aged ab. 35, when administration of his estate was granted to Joseph Willey and to his widow Rachel. The inventory amounted to £1526 48, and the estate was distributed among his children, Zachariah having a double portion as oldest son. His widow Rachel had m. again with ——Waters before Feb. 5, 1754-55, when she presented account of debts, &c.

30 I. JOHN,<sup>4</sup> b. at E. H., May 24, 1699; m. there, Ap. 5, [76 1722, Sarah Saunders; and d. there Nov. 13, 1743, aged ab. 56. The record of the 1st ch. in E. H., in a list of deaths in 1791, has Widow Willey, aged 86.

He is described in a deed of Jan. 23, 1727–28, as a miller, and bought land in Lyme, with a grist-mill and saw-mill thereon, June 5, 1724, of John Pelton, which, with 15\(^3\) acres of land, he sold to his brother Allen Willey for £200. The grist-mill is mentioned in a deed of Abel Willey to Zachariah Willey in 1739. In his will, dated Nov. 11, 1743, and proved Dec. 26, 1743, he gave the saw-mill to his dau. Keziah, but if David would pay £40 he was to have the mill. His brother Allen was executor. The inventory amounted to £514 14 1\(^1\)2.

31 II. ALLEN,<sup>4</sup> b. at E. H., Sept. 29, 1700; bap. at HL., [81 Dec. 22, 1745; m. at E. H., May 7, 1730, Mehitabel, dau. of Lemuel and Mehitabel (Chapman) Richardson, who was b. at Stonington, Conn., Sept. 13, 1709, and bap. there March 26, 1710.

She was 4th in descent from Amos Richardson of Boston, 1645, "a merchant tailor, ship-builder, and landed proprietor, a man of great respectability, enterprise, and good faith," through Stephen and Samuel. They settled at E. H., where he d. Feb. 7, 1780, according to his gravestone, in his 80th year, while the Holmes record says Feb. 9. She d. at E. H., May 5, 1778, in her 69th year. His estate was distributed by his children, Jan. 27, 1780. Those who took part in it were Allen Willey of Lempster, N. H., John Willey of E. H., Christopher Comstock and Ann his wife of Chatham, Conn., John Warner, 2d, and Mehitabel his wife of E. H., Lemuel Willey of E. H., Judah Willey of Wilbraham, Mass., Abraham Willey of E. H., Lemuel Griffing and Lydia his wife of E. H. The will was dated Oct. 31, 1765, and proved March 10, 1782. He was bap. at HL., Dec. 22, 1745, and, with his wife, joined the ch. there on that day.

- 32 III. ELIZABETH,<sup>4</sup> b. at E. H., Dec. 29, 1701; m. ab. 1722 Ebenezer, son of Ebenezer Cone, and grandson of Daniel Cone, who was bap. at E. H., June 18, 1704. She was bap. and joined the 1st ch. in E. H., Aug. 11, 1723, and he joined the same ch. March 8, 1723–24. She d. Aug. 29, 1767, according to a private record; and he d. Feb. 1, 1788, in his 90th year. They had 5 children.
- 33 IV. MARY, b. at E. H., Dec. 13, "1703-4." (So in original record.)
- V. JOSEPH,<sup>4</sup> b. at E. H., Ap. 16, 1705; m. there, May [ **96** 22, 1727, Lucretia, dau. of John and Mary (Willey) Holmes, who was the widow of Willey, and was less than 16 years old at the time of her 2d marriage, having been born at N. L. July 14, 1711. [Holmes Gen., p. 53.]

She d. between 1742 and 1746. He m. (2d) with Rebecca ——, and d. Jan. 9, 1790, "aged ab. 85 years." His widow Rebecca d. Nov. 2, 1807, in her 83d year. Administration of her estate was granted Dec. 7, 1807, to Aaron Willey. The inventory amounted to \$121.61. Seth Willey appears as administrator, Jan. 30, 1810, and distribution was made May 2, 1814, to Barney, Rebecca, Aaron, Dimmis, Seth, Titus and Caroline Willey, and Jemima Lee. A note against Ephraim Willey, who was probably their half brother, was part of the estate.

35 VI. LYDIA,<sup>4</sup> b. at E. H., Ap. 15, 1707; m. there Nov. 29, 1722, Daniel, son of John and Rebecca (Walkley) Booge, who was b. at E. H. Oct. 3, 1699, and bap. there May 21, 1704. He d. there July 11, 1748. [See Booge Gen., p. 3.]

- 36 VII. PHEBE,<sup>4</sup> b. at E. H., Jan. 6, 1709. There are indications that she was the 2d wife of Arthur Scovel of L., afterwards of E. H., where he d. June 1, 1761. If so, she d. before 1772.
- 37 VIII. MEHITABEL,<sup>4</sup> b. at E. H., Sept. 14, 1711; m. there March 18, 1736, John Millard, who was a constituent member of the ch. at HL. June 26, 1745. She had as many as six children.

- 39 X. NOAH,<sup>4</sup> b. at E. H., Aug. 28, 1716; had wife Sarah. [ 116 He d. Feb. 5, 1784, aged "66 years," according to the Holmes Rec., but was really almost 68. His widow was a member of the ch. at HL. Sept. 14, 1785, and d. May 28, 1794, aged 80, according to the Holmes Rec., or according to that of Judah Cone, in her 79th year, of small pox.
- 40 XI. BENAJAH,<sup>4</sup> birth not recorded. He m. Rachel, [ **123** dau. of Samuel and Rachel (Cone) Dutton, who was b. Nov. 6, 1727, and baptized at E. H. Jan. 26, 1728–29.

He d. before Feb. 4, 1752, when administration of his estate was granted to Samuel Dutton and Rachel Willey. The inventory amounted to £2119 19 11½. His widow m. (2d), at Millington, Ap. 5, 1764 or 1765, with Samuel Gates, who d. there Aug. 25, 1801, in his 92d year, and she was living in 1793. Benajah Willey, (No. 134,) was appointed trustee of the will of Samuel Gates, dated May 11, 1793, by which his granddaughter Anne Willey, dau. of Benajah, was to have £6, and the use of certain lands was given to Josiah Willey, till his sons Josiah, Jr., and Austin should be of full age, when the land was to be theirs.

41 XII. SARAH,<sup>4</sup> bap. at HL., Ap. 10, 1748, being ab. 22 years old, so b. about 1726. She m. Oct. 9, 1737, Joseph, s. of Nathaniel and Sarah Beckwith, who was b. Dec. 11, 1715.

According to the record, she d. Aug. 3, 1750, and her husband m. (2d), March 3, 1751, Mrs. Mary Scovel of E. H. But the record of the birth of Asa Beckwith, the first child of this 2d marriage, gives the date as June 3, 1753, while that of his baptism is given as Aug. 20, 1749, from which it would seem there was an error in the record of her death, and that it probably occurred Aug. 3, 1746, and the 2d marriage was not later than March 3, 1748, and the first child was b. in 1749.

The legatees were Ezra his son and his wife, Martha Belding his dau., "Prude Bill" his dau., Jesse his son, and Mary Phelps his granddau. He deeded land, Dec. 25, 1767, to his dau. Sarah Post, who is not mentioned in his will, and her husband Samuel.

The records of his descendants are derived from a record made by Barzillai, (No. 157,) sent me by John Wesley Willey, (No. 1367,) of Lawrence, Kansas, and from information furnished by Rev. C. H. McMillan, of Mt. Vernon, Ind., (No. 1352.) The information contained in these records is partly incorrect, being based on an erroneous tradition that the English ancestor was one John Willey of Doncaster. But for this tradition there is not the slightest foundation, it being a mere guess, based on an anecdote in the Devizes Gazette, in which a curious compound relationship was shown to have arisen from the marriages of this John Willey; while the dates and other statements prove beyond a doubt that Barzillai was the brother of Darius, (No. 61.) Mr. McMillan has taken much pains to obtain information concerning the recent branches of the family, and has kindly sent me all the information in his possession.

61 V. DARIUS,<sup>5</sup> b. at L., May 3, 1737; m. in 1762 Mary, [ 165 dau. of Abel<sup>4</sup> [49] and Mary (Holmes) Willey, who was bap. at Westchester, Conn., Ap. 10, 1743. [Holmes Gen., p. 54.] They removed to Campton, N. H., in 1769. [Campton Centen-

nial, pp. 17, 115, and Willey Mem.] In that year he was appointed one of a committee of the proprietors to lay out the land, give titles, &c., in which service he continued ten or twelve years, receiving four shillings a day when out surveying, and three shillings for other services. He enlisted in 1777. [N. H. Town Papers, xii, 751.] He d. in Campton, March 5, 1829, aged 92, and she d. there March 19, 1819, aged 76. Three of his children were b. in HL. He and his wife were members of the church in HL., and of the Congregational ch. in Campton.

For a full account of him and his descendants, see the Family Memorial of Darius Willey and Wife, with their children, by his grandchildren, San Francisco, 1868, for a copy of which, illustrated with a photograph of the homestead in Campton, I am indebted to Rev. Austin Willey of Northfield, Minn. See also Proceedings of the Centennial Celebration of the Town of Campton, held Sept. 12, 1867, Concord, N. H., 1868, at which the historical discourse was delivered by Rev. Isaac Willey. Tolman Willey, Esq., of Boston, presided, and Diodate Willey and Rev. Austin Willey were two of the Vice-Presidents. All the published accounts of the settlement of Campton say that it was made by Gen. or Capt. Jabez Spencer as an original grantor. But according to N. H. Town Papers, xi, p. 248, the grant was made to Christopher Holmes and 63 others; and it appears certain that there was no Jabez Spencer of E. H. There was a Jared Spencer, b. there Nov. 5, 1762, who d. at E. Windsor, Conn., aged 44, on his return from N. H. The name of Christopher Holmes does not appear among the early settlers of C., and it is probable that Jared Spencer was the agent of the proprietors in conducting the settlement; and the date of his death corresponds with that, 1762, given as the period of the first settlement. Hazen, Plymouth Centen. Disc., doubts the early date assigned for the settlement.

Widow Keziah Miner joined the ch. at HL. July 4, 1790, and d. in Millington March 29, 1807, "aged 85." She had 11 children.

77 II. DAVID,<sup>5</sup> b. at E. H., Ap. 19, 1725; m. at E. [188 H., Aug. 20, 1752, Rachel, probably dau. of Abigail and Sarah (Booge) Spencer, who was b. at E. H. March 6, 1728, and bap. April 1, 1728.

He joined the 1st ch. in E. H., Jan. 14, 1753, but changed his connection and was confirmed in St. Stephen's Prot. Epis. ch. in E. H., Nov. 21, 1794. He m. (2d), Rachel Church, widow of Hezekiah Mack, who had d. in Oct. 1755, at Lake George, in his 28th year. She d. July 10, 1801, in her 69th year, and was b. Sept. 5, 1732, dau. of John and Mary Church, and was perhaps the Rachel Willey who joined the ch. at Millington, July 1, 1792, and the 1st ch. in July, 1796. The recollection of Allen Willey [212] in regard to his family was at fault, as the names of the wife and ch. given by him are those of Benajah Willey [40.]

- 80 V. ASA, b. at E. H., Sept. 6, 1740; d. there Oct. 22, 1743.

Children of ALLEN<sup>4</sup> [31] and Mehitabel (Richardson) Willey.

81 I. ALLEN,<sup>5</sup> b. at E. H., Feb. 11, 1730–31; bap. at [212 HL., Dec. 22, 1745; m. Mary Fuller, b. in Oct. 1730, and who d. in Aug. 1804. He removed to Lempster, N. H., and was town clerk in 1774, selectman in 1777, (N. H. Town Papers, xi, p. 466,) and held some town office till 1803. He enlisted in Gen. Stark's brigade in 1777, and is said to have been at the battle of Bennington in that year.

When at the point of death, one of his ch. said to him: "Father, you are dying; how do you feel?" His reply was: "As if I was going into battle." He d. May 8, 1811. [Other Willeys of Lempster, mentioned in N. H. Town Papers, xiii, p. 502, were Nathan, Reuben, Benjamin, David, Charles, Allen, and Allen Willey, Jr., who in 1789 signed a petition to have Goshen set off from Lempster and adjacent towns.]

82 H. JOHN, b. at E. H., Oct. 11, 1732; bap. at HL., [ **226** Dec. 22, 1745; m. Esther Comstock, who was a member of the

ch. at Millington Dec. 13, 1788, and d. there May 5, 1807, aged 82, according to her gravestone.

He was appointed Capt. of the 12th "company or trainband," of the 12th Connecticut regiment, by commission dated Oct. 24, 1768, which is preserved in the family of Rufus Allen Willey, (Conn. Colon. Rec., xiii, p. 99,) and captain of the 1st company in the 4th battalion of troops raised by Conn. to reinforce the Continental army in N. Y. in 1776. (Hinman, Revolution, pp. 225, 226.) He marched with his company of 43 men from E. H. "for the relief of Boston in the Lexington campaign," under Gen. Joseph Spencer, in 1775, (ib., p. 21,) but as his name is not among the officers appointed in that year, (ib., p. 165,) it may be that, as said by Allen Willey, he went as a volunteer. He is said to have been at the battle of Bunker Hill, but the published accounts of the battle do not mention his company as among those who took part in it. His name appears as member of a court martial at Roxbury, in the orderly book of Gen. Spencer, June 28, 1775, a fragment of which was in his possession, and is now in that of the writer, and was printed by him in Aug. 1887. In 1776 he was Capt. of a Co. in the 1st Conn. militia, commanded by Col. James Wadsworth. (Fowler, Hist. of Durham, p. 184.) He appears to have retired from the army before the close of the war, and to have resided on his farm in Millington. He is mentioned in Allen Willey's notes, which see. He d. at M., Dec. 26, 1805, and his gravestone, in the little burying-ground on his farm there, says he was the first person buried in that burial-ground. His musket, with the date 1777, is in the possession of the family of Rufus Allen Willey, (No. 1578.)

83 III. ANN,<sup>5</sup> b. at E. H., June 4, 1734; bap. at HL., Dec. 22, 1745; m. Christopher Comstock of Chatham, Conn.; d. in March, 1818. (See Nos. 212, 227.)

Administration of his estate was granted Ap. 21, 1781, to his wife Susanna. The inventory amounted to £748 8 4. Distribution was granted March 10, 1791, between the widow, who received £71 19 4, and Catrine, Candace, Ansael, Clarissa, Susannah, and Lydia Willey, each of whom received £9 11, except Ansel, who had £18 18. The notes of Ogden M. Willey say that his family had removed from E. H. before 1837. A record of his children is preserved by Mrs. Emeline Clement, of Alexander, N. Y.

He m., date not found, Deborah, dau. of Thomas and Jane (Hungerford) Harvey, who was b. at E. H. Oct. 19, 1745, and d. at Wilbraham, Mass., Ap. 8, 1783; (2d), at Wilbraham, Feb. 5, 1784, Elizabeth Daniel, both of W.; (3d), at E. H., Nov. 4, 1787, Hannah Saunders? (4th), at Millington, Jan. 8, 1816, Abigail, widow of Joel Willey, (No. 135,) who d. there in Feb. 1876, aged 75.

He, then of Ludlow, Mass., a town adjoining Wilbraham, sold land in E. H., June 22, 1776, to Abraham Willey. The Wilbraham Centennial mentions Judah Willey in a list of soldiers who went out in the Bennington alarm, Sept. 24, 1777, and Allen Willey says he settled in Barre, Vt., after which there is no further trace of him. About the number of his children there is much uncertainty. The Wilbraham records give the birth of Reuben, Deborah, and Azubah, and Allen Willey mentions Judah, Israel, and Asa, and says Reuben was the youngest son, and that a number of sons and daughters were born to him in Barre. Besides these, the Wilbraham records give the marriages of Lucy, Lydia, and Betsey Willey, who are here assumed to have been children of Judah and Deborah Harvey. The same record says that Susannah, dau. of Thomas and Jerusha Willey, was b. March 6, 1785. Who were they?

H., Jan. 12, 1773, Susannah Beckwith, who was probably bap. there Oct. 26, 1754, dau. of Nathaniel and Susannah Beckwith. He moved to Ira, N. Y., in 1804, and settled on lot No. 34, now owned by Heman Benton, a grandson. In Hough's N. Y. State Gazeteer, p. 196, where the name is misprinted Benson, he is styled "Capt. Abraham Willey." He d. May 12, 1841, according to his gravestone in Ira; and she d. Nov. 10, 1835, aged 81.

"There was," writes Mrs. Matilda W. Shepard, "in one of the rooms in his father's house in E. H. a staple in the floor, and to this, in former times, a chain had been attached, the other end of which was fastened round the ankle of a woman reputed to be a witch, and was just long enough to allow her to travel back and forth at a spinning-wheel, but in spite of all precautions she would slip the chain and get away, owing, I suppose, to the evil spirit in her. My grandmother used to tell how once, when she had been to see about some weaving, and was on her way home, (she was on horseback,) her horse travelled uncommonly fast, and when she reached home she found an old woman, who had the reputation of being 'uncanny,' waiting for her, which of course accounted for the horse's speed."

Ap. 3, 1815, aged 69;" but Judah Cone's record says, "Aunt Patience Willey d. Ap. 3, 1815." Administration of his estate was granted March 4, 1816, to Ebenezer Willey. The inventory amounted to \$75.36, and distribution to his children was decreed Jan. 9, 1818. The tradition in Vermont is that Ephraim and Enoch were half brothers. Hence it is probable that Ephraim was twice married.

- 109 XII. DIMMIS,<sup>5</sup> b. at E. H., May 27, 1754; and d. there Nov. 9, 1836.
- 110 XIII. SETH,<sup>5</sup> b. at E. H., Dec. 27, 1756; d. there March 8, 1813. His estate was distributed, Ap. 25, 1814, among his brothers and sisters, which shows that he was without children.
- 111 XIV. JEMIMA,<sup>5</sup> b. at E. H., Aug. 6, 1758; m. there Feb. 11, 1798, Samuel Lee of New Durham, N. Y., who d. before May 5, 1816, when widow Jemima Lee, from Durham, N. Y., joined the ch. at E. H.
  - 112 RACHEL, 6 dau. of Jemima Willey, and reputed dau. of Thomas Harvey, was b. at E. H., June 24, 1786.
- Ap. 6, 1788, Abigail Fuller, dau. of Amasa and Sarah (Fuller) Ackley, who was b. there June 5, 1769, bap. March 28, 1773, and who d. At 14 he enlisted in the Revolutionary army at Hartland, Conn., and was stationed at Fort Griswold. He reenlisted at 19, and was present at the surrender of Burgoyne. He was in the employ of Gen. Wadsworth two or three years, and the only time he lost was on training days. His future wife worked in the kitchen of the farm-house. After their marriage they moved into the "Black River country" in N. Y., a hundred miles from a settlement, where their cabin and its contents were burned, and he had to return for a supply of bread. In 1797 he was licensed as a Methodist preacher, on Herkimer circuit; was admitted on trial in 1799, and ordained deacon in 1801; was on Albany circuit in 1803, and on Black River circuit in 1804. He was a very zealous preacher, and in one year received 400 persons into the church. He had a tin store in N. Y., and exchanged his wares in Canada for furs; but being defrauded by a clerk and obliged to give up everything, he emigrated, and in 1810 went down the Ohio on a raft, and raised a crop of potatoes where Cincinnati now stands; going down to the Falls he found the river low, which he interpreted as a warning to go no further, and built a cabin near where Mrs. Zuloff's residence now stands, east of Jeffersonville, Indiana. Thence he removed to Blue Lick, a few miles in the country, his horse drawing a barrel of salt and a few household goods on two poles attached to his sides. In the Winter of 1812-13 he built a fort for protection from the Indians, and had two U.S. soldiers stationed with him. He was a "shouting Methodist" both in church and at home, and a great friend of the missionary cause. Although a poor man with a large family, he contributed \$100 a year for many years. The little home-made book, covered with brown paper, in which he kept his accounts, is still extant. The future Bishop Ames came to his house once in the interest of the cause, and after retiring heard the old man reprove the girl for throwing the waste tallow from the candle into the fire. He thought nothing was to be expected from such a person, and was much surprised at receiving \$100 the next morning. When

returning from church one day with his wife on his horse behind him, they were fired on by a band of Indians who were pursuing a white man before them. He continued to preach till his death, May 22, 1851, and was buried in the Bowery church graveyard, near Memphis, Indiana.

He enlisted in the alarm of June 29, 1777, but was in service only a few days. [N. H. Rev. Rec., ii, 35.]

In 1834 he noted down his recollections as to the origin of the family and his near relatives. There are two copies of this document, one in the possession of the family of his son Charles, and the other in that of his daughter Frances Willes. They are substantially alike, but have some unimportant variations. Perhaps he had made two copies for different members of his family, and the differences arose from failure of memory. This document is as follows:

"As a source of amusement for the day, I thought I would look for the original of the name Willey. I find upon examination that it is the name of one of the principal rivers in Wales, Wiltshire Co., England, given to it, in all probability, on account of the many willows that grew on its banks. In the year 1686, by reason of the many troubles and disputes that then existed, two brothers of the name of Willey sought a home in the New World. [The other copy says, "emigrated in the year 1607 or '8 to escape the tribulations of that important revolutionary era in the history of Britain."] It so happened that

they embarked on board different vessels, one of which was wrecked in a storm and was never more heard of. The other came safely and landed at New London, in the State of Connecticut. John, (for that was his Christian name,) having a small property in money, was enabled to purchase a fine tract of land in the new colony, in a place called East Haddam, where in the course of a few years he became an opulent and thrifty farmer. He married an amiable woman, by whom he had ten children, seven sons and three daughters. Abel, John, Isaac, Allen, Joseph, Noah, Benjamin, [Benajah in 2d copy,] all lived to be settled and had families. The daughters' names I have forgotten. From these the race of Willey are descended. Now I will go a little into particulars, as far as they have come to my knowledge. The families of Abel, John, and Isaac, were small. A son of John named David [77] married a girl named Fuller. They had three children, John, David, and Abigail. John was a blacksmith, had a large family. I knew two of them, Calvin [517] and Asa [576]. Calvin settled in Tolland, was an eminent lawyer, and afterwards became a Senator in Congress from that State. As a settled in Ellington, and was afterwards appointed one of the Judges for the Co. of Hartford. David had no children. Abigail married a Markham, who removed to New Hampshire. He was the first inhabitant of Lempster. Thence moved to Ackworth, thence to Genesee Co., New York. A few months after their arrival there both died, leaving four sons, William, David, John, Arnold, and a number of daughters. William accumulated a handsome property.

Allen, [13], my grandfather, married Mary Richardson. They had ten children, eight of whom grew up, two having died in infancy. Their names were Allen, Mehitabel, Ann, John, Lemuel, Lydia, Judah, and Abraham. My uncle John [82] married a Comstock and settled in East Haddam, was a good farmer, and attended to his own business. He was often a selectman in that town, and commanded a volunteer company in the battle of Bunker Hill, and lived to a good old age. Lemuel [90] settled near him, married a fine woman, had a fine lot of children. Their names I have now forgotten, except that of Calvin. He settled in New Haven, Vermont, and is doing well. Judah [92] married a Harvey, lived several years near my grandfather, and was a good blacksmith. He afterwards removed to Wilbraham, Mass. From there he went to Barre, Vermont, where were born to him a number of sons and daughters. Judah [243] and Israel [244] removed to Ohio, about 20 miles west of Cincinnati. have lately heard that they are doing well. Reuben, [248], my uncle's youngest son, married a Gale for his wife, went to Irasburg, afterwards removed to Penfield, Orleans Co., N. Y., purchased a large farm, became one of the members of the Assembly for said Co., and is doing well.

Abraham [95] was the youngest son, resided at home with his parents, treating them ever with the greatest kindness and respect. They lived to upwards of 80 years, and died respected. He married Susannah Beckwith, had three sons, Allen, Baruch, and Wolcott, and several daughters. The oldest, named Anna, [253], married Eli Matson, who, embarking in the mercantile business, became involved, and was obliged to seek a new home, which was chosen at Cato, N. Y., on the east side of Lake Ontario, where he resided several years, and by the assistance of my uncle purchased 300 acres of land, my uncle at the same time purchasing 1100 more. I was there in 1811. Matson was in prosperous circumstances and 'going ahead.' The country, however, was very new.

In 1823 I paid him a visit, when he had become a very wealthy and independent farmer, with five or six tenants for assistance. [The 2d copy adds that Abraham's son Allen was a clothier, Baruch a tanner and currier, and that in 1823 "he lived in fine style."]

Now I will take up the Uncle John family. There were Jabez [227], John [232], and Alfred [234], and three girls. Jabez lived at home on the old farm, has one son living on the place, the only one when I was there two years ago. My Uncle Abraham had one son also living in E. Hadam. John married, went to Adams in the northwest part of Massachusetts. His oldest son is a physician, [Erastus, 858], gone to the Carolinas; the second a Baptist minister, [Aristarchus, 860], now in Michigan Territory; have often heard from him. Alfred, another son, went to Whitesborough; from there he moved to Ogden. He died three years since. My Uncle Lemuel [90], lived in Millington, had several children and a good farm; in [February, 2d copy,] 1778 died suddenly in a fit of apoplexy. His oldest son [Ansel, 235], lived at New Haven, Vermout, the rest scattered. Mehitabel [86], married a Warren, [Warner, 2d copy] by whom she had four sons and two daughters.

John [87], married a Church, had several children, and after several moves settled in Livonia, State of New York; is a worthy member of society (and withal a deacon of the church.) He has a likely family, and doing well. Lemuel [89; Samuel, 2d copy], lives at Herkimer, N. Y. Israel [88], is a physician in Litchfield, N. Y. Anna [83], married a Comstock and settled in Chatham, Conn.; has two sons; Richardson [84], died in the West Indies in his 21st year; Jabez [85], lived with his father, had two children, one of whom is now judge of the court in Middlesex. Lydia [93], married a Griffin, an uncle of President Griffin of Williams College, Maryland,

and further saith not Allen Willey."

He d. at M. "on Saturday the third day of March [1821] in the morning before sunrise," as appears by a letter from his son Rufus to his brother Ethan, of Lebanon, Ashtabula Co., Ohio, dated at E. H., June 15, 1821, aged 65; but it appears that he had previously written March 7, and was anxious to learn whether that letter had been received. He mentions his father's will, of which he was executor, and says that by it he was directed to pay Ethan one hundred and fifty dollars, in three annual instalments. "He has gave his gun and one bed to you, [hiatus,] that I must give you his grate coat, [hiatus,] and he directed me to pay Ursula fifty in one year from his Deceas \* \* Selina Chapman keeps hous for me." He gives the following marriages and deaths: "Mr. Alfred Capman to Miss Mary Willey; Mr. Elijah Capman to Miss Patsy Wood; Mr. Thomas Rothburn to Miss Ann Ingram of Lyme; last of all old Mr. Wm. Burke to Miss Olive Arnold; died last December Mr. Gurdon Ray [hiatus] Jun. wife aged 27. Mr. George Cone died in May [hiatus.]"

He says the Probate Court has appointed the term of six months from the 22d of March, 1821, for the creditors of Jabez Willey to exhibit their claims to him as executor. The estate was distributed, Dec. 12, 1821, between Ethan, Rufus, and Ursula Dodge, each receiving \$18.20. Calvin Dodge, of South New Lyme, Ohio, to whom I am indebted for this and the following letter, is in possession of the gun above referred to and of the horn belonging to it, which has cut on it: "Jabez Willey horn made at Fort Trumbull, Febw'y ye 1777, in defence of Liberty." Around the inscription is a good deal of ornamental work. The following letter of Jabez Willey is copied in its original spelling and punctuation:

"EAST HADDAM May the 4th 1818

"Dear Children After our Abcence from Eche other I Set Down to Wright to you to let you no that we are all well and we hope this Will find you all In good health We hant no News to write But It is Some time Since I wrote I thote I would write once more We recevd your letter Dated the 1 Day of february Ursulas was Dated the 6 of January 1818 and we have read them so much that they are all Wore out and we Should Be glad of more and I hope you Will Send more as soon as you get this

Mrs. Ward, [1033,] in a letter written in 1884, says of this family: "Father's brother John married Susan Rogers, proud as a peacock, sister to the celebrated Dr. Rogers of New York city. He had a nephew that lived in Ogden, poor as he could be. After father's brother John married he went to live in the town of Adams in Massachusetts. Now as to Uncle John's family there were three sons, four daughters. Susan, [861] the eldest, was courted by Billings Richmond. Her father didn't like him very well, sent her to Connecticut for six months, thinking she might forget him and pick up some other chap. She was true to Mr. Richmond, came home and married him. I never saw Rheum. Elivia [902], married a man by name Mark Salmon, lived in Bloomfield, N. Y. Ann [919], was married to Mr. Johnson. Henry Willey [857], married Lois Harrison, a niece of President Harrison. Aristarchus [860], had a good deal of the Rogers blood in him; he was glad to lay stonewall to get money to educate himself. He was a Baptist minister. Henry Willey, Esq., died in Blissfield, Mich. liv (sic) beside himself and wife, two [sons] and four daughters. George left a wife and one child. Cornelia [1605], left a husband, his name was Sackett, a very handsome man." Mrs. Strong says she was well acquainted with Henry Willey, and that he had three sons and two daughters, all of whom died young, and that he and his wife died comparatively young; that he had a woolen factory in Churchville, N. Y., and that his wife became deranged and went crazy on the subject of religion.

A notice of him appeared in the Chillicothe, Mo., Constitution, which says: "With the close of the old year passed away one of the pioneers of the Grand River Valley, who was one of the most honorable and upright gentlemen that have ever lived in our country. Col. Matson came to this country nearly forty years ago, and settled where the present flourishing town of Utica now stands, which town he founded and named in honor of his old home in the East, and which for a time disputed with Chillicothe for the location of the county seat. During his long residence in our county Col. Matson has been recognized as a gentleman whose character was above reproach, as a citizen of enterprise and public spirit, as a Christian gentleman whose conduct and daily walk in all the affairs of this life attested that religion was with him a reality. He has filled a number of important public stations, and discharged the duties of each with scrupulous fidelity. For a number of years he was public administrator of this county, and no man ever more carefully and scrupulously guarded the rights of the widow and the fatherless. At a meeting of the friends of law and order, in Chillicothe, called by Col. Matson and others, Aug. 5, 1863, 'to protest against and put down the scoundrelism that was being perpetrated in the name of Loyalty,' he was chosen chairman, and the sequel proved that he was the right man in the right place. A mob with

revolvers and other weapons tried to break up the meeting; for a few minutes it seemed as though blood would be shed; but he stood up and denounced and defied the ruffians, and told them that the friends of law and order would put them down at all hazards. Men took fresh courage and rallied around the old hero, and the mob's courage soon oozed out, and they sneaked away; and from that day to the close of the struggle the people of Livingston County enjoyed a good degree of social peace and order."

In 1824 he was a candidate for the United States Senate, but was defeated; but in 1825 he was elected to that body, and served six years, till 1831, when he returned to the practice of his profession, but did not regain his former standing. In 1834 he returned to Strafford, where he d. Aug. 23, 1858. "He was a man of more than ordinary intellect, and his attainments as a lawyer were very fair. At one time he stood at the head of the bar in Tolland County. always entered into the cause of his client with his whole heart; indeed, he often became so identified with his client as to make success a matter of personal feeling; and he sometimes lost sight of the true interests of his client in his zeal to defend the claims he set up. At the close of his life the bar of Tolland County noticed his memory by appropriate resolutions." See Judge Waldo's Hist. of Tolland, pp. 105-108, Poore's Congressional Directory, and Lanman's Biog. Annals.

His second circuit was half of the present State of Missouri, and his last Flatrock circuit in Indiana. He preached almost daily for six years, travelling 20,000 miles, and receiving \$162.62½ for a year's service. At the end of this period he settled in Paris, Ind., and from 1820 to 1833 was making sermons which show him to have been what people call a more than ordinary preacher. He m. July 13, 1826, Margaret Gassaway, who d. Jan. 2, 1841; (2d) Lydia P. Robinson; both women of saintly character.

John Wesley was licensed as a Methodist preacher in 1838, in Clark Co., Ind. In 1857 he removed to Kansas, taking a saw-mill with him, and settled near Blue Mound, Douglas Co. He was chaplain of a Kansas regiment during Price's raid. He was a life-long and devoted Methodist, and a preacher for 40 years, resigning a short time before his death, which occurred Sept. 4, 1881, as the result of injuries occasioned by being thrown from his carriage while returning from church. "He was," says a notice of him by G. S. Dearborn, of Vineland, Kansas, "highly esteemed as a citizen, and took an active part in everything tending to improve society. Industrious, prudent, and discreet in his affairs, he planned well for his family and the church. \* \* \* The text to be used at the funeral (Rev. vii, 13–17,) was found carefully noted down among his papers after his death."

In 1845 he became agent of the N. H. Home Missionary Society, and removed to Pembroke, N. H., and in 1837 to Goffstown, N. H. After a ministry of 17 years there, he became agent for N. H. of the Am. Bible Society, and wrote its reports for 26 years. He delivered the historical address at the Campton Centennial, Sept. 12, 1867; wrote historical sketches of the churches in Campton and Pembroke, and a history of the N. H. Bible Society. In 1865 he returned to Pembroke and bought a small farm, which he "proposed to cultivate in old age," and d. there Oct. 25, 1883, aged 90. In a sketch of his mother's side of the family, dated Sept. 1882, he says: "Our grandfather Joseph Pulsifer, b. in 1744, was a native of Ipswich, Mass. We have little more of his early history than that he was religiously trained, and that he learned the trade of a cabinet-\* \* \* Grandmother was from Newburyport, brought up in city habits and manners, yet she at 18, in 1770, accompanied her husband an hundred miles on horseback, (never before on a horse,) into the wilderness. Her original name was Mary Brown. One of her sisters became the wife of the Rev. Noah Worcester. This family of Brown came from the ministry of Rev. Mr. Parsons, who was regarded as one of the new lights in the great awakening of 1770. He was in full sympathy with Mr. Whitefield, under whose pulpit he was buried. Our grandmother, though she never thought fit to belong to the church, yet lived a religious life. Her family carefully kept the Sabbath and attended public worship. They were required daily to read the Bible. The family was brought up to great industry, and were never allowed to neglect their religious duties. They lived remote from others, and spent their evenings and leisure time in reading. There was in the place a small library, from which they drew books which were well read. The result was a family of 11 children - one died in infancy - four sons and six daughters, of large and vigorous frames, and without schools or question they were the most intelligent and best educated family in town, and all, it was hoped, became the subjects of the kingdom of our Lord! None of them became rich, but all were provided for in an independent position, and bore their proportion in the burdens of society. They were everywhere the most influential. Such were the circumstances in which our mother, the oldest daughter in their family, came forward in life. She brought the influence of her mother's training into her own family. She did not feel in early life that she had had a change of heart, which she regarded as necessary. Yet her instructions were safe for children to follow. The oldest members of the family who yet live will remember how earnest she was in teaching the Catechism, the Ten Commandments, and other portions of the Bible, and many of Watts' hymns. Our family were kept in the house of God on the Sabbath, and were made familiar with His word. Such was the family

before the revival in 1815. Let every descendant in this family line trace back the good influence which we have felt from our ancestry to our mother, our grandmother, and our great-grandmother; to the great awakening 150 years ago; to the preaching of Whitefield and other good men who worked with him. This influence has been sustained through three generations by God's word, accompanied as it has been by His spirit." [See Willey Mem. for this and other members of the family; Campt. Price, and just escaped being killed. He continued to live for some years at Fort Gibson, and labored for a time with the Creek Indians. He now resides at Andover, Mass., as Secretary of the Am. On his return he became pastor of the Cong. ch. in Vera Cruz, and afterwards of that in Benicia, where he now resides. His experience in California is recorded in "Thirty Years in California," San Francisco, 1879. Besides this he has written First Ten Years' Ministry in California, 1859; A Farewell Discourse, 1862; A History of the Howard Presbyterian Church, 1869; History of Vera Cruz; History of the College of California, in Papers of Calif. An obituary notice of her appeared in the Lockport Daily Journal of March 8, 1882, which says that she went with her husband to Ogden in 1810. "They began the world with slender means, building a log-house in the construction of which not a nail was used. In earlier years she used often to say that her constant prayer was that she might not outlive her usefulness, and that prayer seemed to have been granted. She could not bear to be idle. She retained all her faculties to an extraordinary degree, and was remarkably active on her feet until an accident last November, which crippled her for the remainder of her

days. But even after that she delighted to be doing bits of knitting or embroidery for some of her children or grandchildren, and there was a pathetic satisfaction in seeing her thus employed. Her letters, written without glasses, which she never used, were, considering her years, marvels of neatness and legibility. She had a deeply religious nature, and no cloud of doubt ever seemed to cross the heaven of her perfect faith. She waited patiently for the change so dreaded by many, but which for years was regarded by her as a happy release. It came at last, and her worn-out fragile frame now lies buried by that of her husband, from whom she had been separated during her long widowhood of eight and thirty years."

Mr. Trowbridge is a well known writer in prose and verse. His literary tendencies developed themselves at an early age, when he contributed to the columns of a newspaper in Rochester, N. Y., which is near his native place. At the age of 19 he went to New York city and wrote for the press there, and in 1848 to Boston, where he soon became known as a writer of popular tales, under the signature "Paul Creyton." After travelling extensively in this country, he visited Europe in 1855, passing a year chiefly in France and Italy. In 1865 he travelled in the Southern States, and made his observations the subject of a book, "The South," published the following year. He has been a copious contributor to the magazines, and edited "Our Young Folks," in which several of his stories for boys first appeared, until it was merged in "St. Nicholas" in 1873. He now resides in Arlington, Mass., going little into society, but giving occasional readings from his own works for social and charitable purposes. His principal prose writings in fiction, in the order of their publication, are Martin Merivale, a story of city life, perhaps embodying some of his own early experience, 1854; Neighbor Jackwood, a faithful picture of American rural life, written in Paris, which was dramatized and played with success in New York and Boston, 1856; Cudjo's Cave and The Drummer Boy, 1863; The Three Scouts, 1864; Lucy Arlyn, 1866; four stories based on incidents in the civil war; Neighbors' Wives, 1867; Coupon Bonds, and other stories, 1870; Farnell's Folly, 1884. A number of his magazine stories for boys, written from 1871 to 1883, have also been published in book form. In poetry, The Vagabonds was first published in

the Atlantic Monthly in 1863, republished in an illustrated volume in 1864, and again with other poems in 1869. The Emigrant's Story, and other poems, followed in 1874; The Book of Gold, and other poems, in 1877; Guy Vernon, a novelette in verse, in "The Masque of Poets," in 1878; A Home Idyll, and other poems, in 1881. A writer in Scribner's Monthly says of him as a novelist: "His characters are all vitally conceived, and hence his page is essentially dramatic, - full of action and the throb of real life, as distinguished from novels that are mainly narrative and descriptive. He has unmistakably the genial, magnetic heart-nature that is characteristic of the true race of creators. He stands on the common level and appeals to the universal heart, and all that he suggests or achieves is on the plane and in the line of the march of the great body of humanity. One other trait, noteworthy in these days, is his hearty good nature, and entire freedom from the contempt, the condescension, the irreverence and superciliousness that vitiate so much of the work of our younger geniuses. There is only charity and good-will in his hearty laugh. He does not portray human nature through mere intellectual acuteness and cleverness, but creatively, through his sympathy and hearty affiliation with it, in all its normal forms and conditions." Of his poetry, a writer in Harper's Magazine for Jan. 1882, says: "There are few among our living American poets (none, perhaps, save Longfellow and Whittier,) who are more perfect masters than he of the simple cadences and musical harmonies of our English verse, or who unfold a story with more persuasive art."

He graduated at Hamilton College, N. Y., 1816. Before me is his graduation thesis, written in Latin. He educated himself by his own exertions, and was accustomed to say that he was not indebted to any person a cent for his education. Soon after graduating he made a journey to the West, as far as St. Louis, and returned much disgusted with the country as he saw it. On his return he studied law, and was admitted to the bar of the Supreme Court of New York after his marriage, and settled in Geneseo, N. Y. He m. March 5, 1823, Abigail Belden, dau. of Elisha and Ruth (Hurlburt) Chamberlain, of Dalton. Mass., who was b. there Sept. 9, 1798, and d. in G., Aug. 3, 1824; (2d) May 5, 1825, Grace Maria, dau. of John and Grace (Howard) Stanley, of G., who was b. Ap. 3, 1806. She removed to Iowa in 1855, and to California in 1876, where she lives in Gilroy with her children. He d. in G., Jan. 30, 1849, aged 56. He was a man of more than ordinary ability. Not possessing the gift of eloquence, he did not shine as an advocate at the bar; but for knowledge of the law and soundness in counsel he was the equal of his brethren in the profession, and was considered "the end of the law" in his county. Life-long ill health, caused by early application to study, a want of ambition, and perhaps a very strict conscientiousness, prevented his attaining the position in professional and public life to which his talents would have entitled him. The religious element was strong in him. He was a member of the 1st Presbyterian ch. in G., a regular attendant on its services, and a strict observer of the Sabbath. For a long series of years he had family worship every morning, at which a chapter of the Bible was read, each of the children, as they grew old enough, reading a verse in turn; in this way the Bible was read through more than once before the separation of the family; and the children were required to commit to memory passages from it, enjoining moral duties. But there is reason to believe that he modified the rigor of his doctrinal belief before he died, although he was not disposed to converse on the subject. His family discipline was strict, and sometimes severe. He never conversed with his children about the incidents of his early life, but he had an earnest desire for their welfare, and gave them the best education his means would afford; and they entertain a sincere respect for his memory, mixed with a regret that there had not been more freedom and confidence in their mutual intercourse. With all his external seriousness he had a large share of wit and humor, and could turn a bit of verse neatly upon occasion. He was for many years Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of Livingston County, and for a quarter of a century was every four years chosen a Justice of the Peace of the town of Geneseo. In 1837, while on a journey East for his health, he visited his native town, and made some memoranda concerning the history of the family.

[Abigail Belden Chamberlain was descended from Henry Chamberlain, who came to N. E. in 1638, and was of Hingham, Mass., in 1674, and had w. Jane, and five ch., of whom William, the 2d, was of Hadley, Mass., and m. at Hatfield, Mass., June 6 or 8, 1688, Mercy Dickinson. They removed to Colchester, Conn. He had ten ch., of whom John, the youngest, who probably m. a dau. of Ebenezer Day, had s. John who settled in Pittsfield, Mass., and his s. Elihu, who m. Ruth Hurlburt, was of Dalton, Mass., and the father of Abigail B.

From records in the possession of the family of Grace Maria Stanley, it appears that Nathaniel Howard, by will dated in 1700, and by an alteration of the same dated at Salem, Mass., Dec. 17, 1705, gave lands in Beverly, Mass., to his s. Stephen, which were given to him by his father Nicholas Howard, of Salem or Beverly, who d. before 1688. This may have been the Nicholas Howard mentioned by Savage as of Salem in 1643, and probably removed to Boston, and by w. Elizabeth had ch. Richard, b. in 1665, Rebecca and John. Ten eh. of the above Nathaniel were mentioned in his will, one of whom, Stephen, says that his father d. Dec. 19, 1720, and his mother Elizabeth, Ap. 17, 1730. Her maiden name was probably Hartshorn, as he says: "Father Hartshorn d. Oct. 16, 1787, aged 88 years, if he had lived till the 6th of May." Stephen resided in Mansfield, Windham Co., Conn., and went to Yarmouth, Nova Scotia, to settle, after the neutral French were expelled, and d. there Feb. 23, 1762, in his 79th year. He had 7 ch., of whom the 3d, Nathaniel, was b. Dec. 19, 1718. He lived successively in Conn., Westfield, Mass., and Stephentown, N. Y., where he d. Oct. 20, 1777, and his w. He gave much attention to art and literature, on subjects connected with which he was a favorite lecturer, and to the organization of the schools of the city, of which he was for several years Superintendent. His reports were valuable, and greatly influenced the formation of the school systems in many of the cities of the West. It was said of him that "his mind is unusually well balanced, and he sees the relative value of knowledge better than any man I ever saw. \* \* \* Broader and more philosophical notions of education for the million especially characterized our School Board while he was Secretary eight or ten years." He was appointed by President Grant U. S. Dist. Atty. for the Northern Dist. of Ohio, and reappointed on his reelection. At times he was President of the Law Library Association, and of the Cleveland Homeopathic Association. He was twice married, his 2d wife being Julia, dau. of John C. Vaughn, of C., who survived him. He had no children, and d., after a long illness, Dec. 29, 1884. At a meeting of the Cleveland bar, Dec. 31, ad-

dresses on his life and character were made by his associates, and suitable resolutions were adopted. A notice of him appeared in the Cleveland Leader of Dec. 31, 1884, and a biography in Tract 67 of the Western Reserve Historical Society, Cleveland, 1886.
